The "CAP" Act

- Lower Federal spending to 20.8 percent of GDP by 2021
- Applies to all spending including Social Security
- Automatic sequestration of spending if spending is expected to exceed cap
- Cuts by program in proportion to the growth in costs in the most recent year
 - Because the aging population, greater health needs and poor economy contribute to the high growth in Social Security, Medicare and Medicaid, these programs are hit especially hard
- Medicare and Medicaid payments would be cut by \$1.6 trillion

Would cut \$4.2 trillion dollars from federal spending from 2013-2021




Impact on People by 2021

- Social Security benefits would be cut by nearly 20 percent
- Cuts to Social Security and other income support programs would force 3.8 million people into poverty--2.1 million of them seniors, a 44% increase
- 5.1 million individuals would lose their health insurance
- Cuts to hospitals would force most to operate in the red, jeopardizing access to care
- Dramatic reductions in fees for physician services could lead to fewer physicians participating in Medicare
- Up to 1.3 million health care workers could lose their jobs
- Cost shifting of federal payment shortfalls to private employers could lead to a nearly 5% increase in health insurance premiums




The CAP Act would cut \$4.2 trillion across a range of programs

Mandatory programs - Social Security, Medicare and Medicaid - are hit especially hard


Average Percentage Reduction in Spending by Spending Group under the CAP Act: 2013-2021





3.8 million people would be forced into poverty by 2021


Increase in the Number of People Living Below the Federal Poverty Level in 2021 Under the CAP Act (thousands)
